1.1 - Curriculum Design and Development

The College prioritizes holistic student development through innovative and contextualized education, aiming to empower students for societal transformation. Offering 16 UG and 12 PG programs, the institution adopted the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in 2016, revising it in 2019 and upgrading to Outcome Based Education (OBE) in 2022, aligning with its Vision and Mission. Within the OBE framework, Program Outcomes (POs), Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs) are meticulously designed to address diverse developmental needs spanning local to global levels. PSOs and COs are structured to reflect POs, partially achieved at course completion and fully realized upon program completion, evaluated at both levels.

UG and PG POs emphasize science and technology for national development and the acquisition of scientific temperaments. PG programs highlight interdisciplinary research for innovation.

Environmental sustainability, values, and ethics are central to both UG and PG programs.

Skill development is emphasized through courses on communication, soft skills, and life skills, supported by field projects and internships as per POs and PSOs.

Courses like Personality Development, Social Responsibility, and Global Citizenship contribute to holistic student development, evident in various POs across programs.The Naan Mudhalvan initiative is a comprehensive skill-based program integrated into the curriculum to enhance student employability.

The extension component of the UG curriculum underscores students' role in social transformation, aligning with the college's mission.

The comprehensive five-part UG curriculum promotes interdisciplinary, skill-oriented learning, nurturing socially responsible citizens. This structure fosters horizontal and integral learning experiences, as evident in POs and PSOs.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 - Institution has an IT policy covering Wi-Fi, cyber security, etc. and has allocated budget for updating its IT facilities

The institution's IT policy undergoes periodic updates, focusing on areas such as Wi-Fi infrastructure, cybersecurity, and software enhancements to facilitate ICT-enabled teaching and learning. Notable upgrades since the previous accreditation include:

1. A significant increase in internet bandwidth from the previous 50 Mbps allocation.

A grant of Rs.1904113 was approved, with 12 lakh designated for installing and updating the college's WiFi infrastructure. 8 lakh has been allocated for covering the annual recurring expenses associated with the WiFi connection.

- 2. Expansion of Wi-Fi coverage across the campus, accompanied by the installation of additional high-configured routers to cater to the needs of students and faculty for research and project work.
- Implementation of advanced security measures on machines, including Windows firewall and Defender/Antivirus protection, to enhance cybersecurity.
- 4. Upgradation of computing facilities, where 37 PCs with Intel Core2Duo processors and 4 GB RAM, each with 2x500 GB hard disks, have been replaced with 90 PCs featuring i3, i5, and i7 processors, 4/8 GB RAM, and 1 TB hard disks. Additionally, server capacities have been bolstered with 64 GB RAM and a minimum of 4 TB hard disk storage.
- 5. Establishment of a modern media center and digital lab equipped with state-of-the-art multimedia devices, including PCs and projectors, to support multimedia-based learning and teaching methodologies.

Oversight of the college's physical infrastructure falls under the purview of the College Maintenance Committee, led by the Principal, ensuring diligent development, upkeep, and utilization of facilities. The recent completion of the Science block construction awaits student occupancy postpandemic.

Environmental stewardship is a priority, managed by the Campus Maintenance Committee like NCC, NSS, to sustain an eco-friendly campus environment. Regular meetings of various committees ensure optimal allocation of financial resources for maintenance, prioritizing student needs. The institution prioritizes maintaining a pristine campus to enhance academic and non-academic endeavors.

Rigorous hygienic practices and a comprehensive waste management approach, centered on reducing, reusing, and recycling, are key. Waste receptacles are strategically placed for segregating biodegradable, recyclable, and non-degradable materials, with organic waste composted for campus use.

Plastic use is prohibited, establishing a plastic-free zone. M.Sc. Botany students undergo a two-phase internship. They learn gardening, Vermicomposting, and organic farming techniques at Chennai Organic Farmers, then advance to Marina Labs for aerobiology studies. Liquid waste is managed through regular inspections, maintaining water transport systems, and repurposing rejected water for irrigation. The Physical Education department maintains first aid kits, disposing of related waste responsibly.

E-waste, managed by the Computer Science department, is disposed of through authorized vendors. Hazardous chemicals are replaced with safer alternatives in labs, with measures for responsible discharge. Radioactive elements are not used, ensuring safety. By adhering to green practices and waste management protocols, the college fosters a pollution-free campus conducive to learning and well-being.
