1.1 - Curriculum Design and Development

The College focuses on holistic student development through innovative, context-driven education, empowering students for societal transformation. Offering 16 UG and 13 PG programs, the institution implemented the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in 2016, updated it in 2019, and transitioned to Outcome Based Education (OBE) in 2022, in line with its Vision and Mission.

The college follows common syllabus prescribed by the TANSCHE from the academic year 2023 -2024. The syllabus is designed to coordinate and uphold standards in higher education institutions, research centers, and scientific and technical institutions, in accordance with the guidelines issued by the University Grants Commission from time to time.

Within the OBE framework, Program Outcomes (POs), Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs) are carefully crafted to meet developmental needs from local to global scales. PSOs and COs align with POs, partially achieved by course completion and fully realized upon program completion, evaluated at both levels.

UG and PG POs focus on science, technology, and developing a scientific mindset, while PG programs emphasize interdisciplinary research and innovation. Environmental sustainability, values, and ethics are integral to both UG and PG programs. The Naan Mudhalvan initiative is a comprehensive skill-based program integrated into the curriculum to enhance student employability.

Skill development is promoted through courses on communication, soft skills, and life skills, supported by field projects and internships. Additionally, Personality Development, Social Responsibility, and Global Citizenship courses contribute to holistic growth, reflected in the POs.

4.3 - IT Infrastructure

The institution's IT policy undergoes periodic updates, focusing on areas such as Wi-Fi infrastructure, cybersecurity, and software enhancements to facilitate ICT-enabled teaching and learning. Notable upgrades since the previous accreditation include:

- 1. A significant increase in internet bandwidth from the previous 50 Mbps allocation.
 - A grant of Rs.1904113 was approved, with 12 lakh designated for installing and updating the college's WiFi infrastructure. 8 lakh has been allocated for covering the annual recurring expenses associated with the WiFi connection.
- 2. Expansion of Wi-Fi coverage across the campus, accompanied by the installation of additional highconfigured routers to cater to the needs of students and

- faculty for research and project work.
- 3. Implementation of advanced security measures on machines, including Windows firewall and Defender/Antivirus protection, to enhance cybersecurity.
- 4. Upgradation of computing facilities, where 37 PCs with Intel Core2Duo processors and 4 GB RAM, each with 2x500 GB hard disks, have been replaced with 90 PCs featuring i3, i5, and i7 processors, 4/8 GB RAM, and 1 TB hard disks. - 1. The old steel chairs, once in a dilapidated state, underwent a significant transformation to avoid being discarded as waste and harming the environment. Under the visionary guidance of the Principal, these chairs were carefully renovated and restored for continued use. Now, 150 refurbished chairs have been repurposed and placed in the auditorium. NSS students fully dedicated themselves to painting and revamping old wooden benches and desks.
